## Opera Club

Our May meeting is May 11 at 10 am in the RCN. We will show a version of Antonin Dvorák *Rusalka*. The eponymous opera refers to a lakedwelling water sprite with dreams of more. Our Rusalka has been inspired to "more" due to falling in love with the local prince who takes a break from his hunting to bathe in her lake. As a noncorporeal entity she comes to the conclusion that the only way to fully love the prince is to take human form. So, she pleads with Ježibaba to turn her into a human, fully acknowledging that she will lose her power of speech.

Sound familiar? Well, Jaroslav Kvapil, the librettist, was inspired by the Hans Christian

Anderson story of the Little Mermaid. But the original fairy tale is darker than the Disney re-imagining, and the *Rusalka* opera is darker yet.

Despite the darker story, the opera features one of the most beautiful arias in all of opera, "The Song to the Moon." If you search for this aria, you will find any number of exquisite performances. My position is that the high quality of the many versions is due to the fact that the difficulty of the Czech language serves as a filter to discourage



the less-than-completely serious singers. The U.S. contributor of note is Renée Fleming (inset), who sings The Song to the Moon just about everywhere. But please search further, there are so many great versions.

Darker than Disney and Anderson? In addition to becoming mute, Rusalka must also lose her beauty and her immortality. Moreover, she has to convince the prince to marry her or he will die and she will be eternally damned.

Rusalka goes through the transformation to human form, but is foiled by the fickle prince's affections for a foreign princess who steals his heart. The foreign princess spurns the prince but

the Rusalka's hopes have been dashed. The prince re-visits the lake to repent to Rusalka, asking for a kiss knowing that his kiss of love will mean his death. The prince takes responsibility for his betrayal, kisses Rusalka and dies. In dying, the prince's love saves Rusalka from eternal damnation.
