This month's Club showing, *The Coronation of Poppea*, may be too challenging for novices, so feel free to consider an upcoming showing instead. Here is the plan for the rest of the year.

July: *La Traviata* by Guiseppe Verdi. The notable scene is the Brinsisi, a drinking party with a drinking song, "Libbiamo" ("Let's Drink!).

August: *Thaïs* by Jules Massenet. The signature passage is the Meditation. This is a sublime violin solo signifying the religious conversion of Thaïs.

September: *La Bohème*, by Giacomo Puccini. There are three, back-to-back-to-back signature arias, "Si mi chiamano Mimi," "Che gelida manina," and "O soave fianculla."

October: *Nabucco* by Guiseppe Verdi. The signature piece is a choral number, "Va, pensiero." This music is the theme song of the risorgimento which resulted in the creation of the nation of Italy.

November: *Fidelio* by Ludwig van Beethoven has a great quartet and another signature chorus, "Prisoners Chorus." The sub-title of Beethoven's only opera is "Leonore, or the Triumph of Marital Love."
